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EC Communication on the Modernisation Agenda for Universities

Adopted on 10 May 2006, the European Commission has finalised its Communication to the Council and European Parliament on "Delivering on the Modernisation Agenda for Universities: Education, Research and Innovation". This follows on from the 2005 Communication "Mobilising the Brainpower of Europe: enabling the universities to make their full contribution to the Lisbon Strategy" and from discussions on the role of the universities that took place at the informal meeting of the European Council in Hampton Court in October 2005. The Communication points to the coordinated action required from Member States, universities and the Commission that is required if universities are to achieve their potential as crucial actors at the centre of the knowledge triangle linking education, research and innovation.

Many of the reforms recommended in the paper take up key issues that EUA has discussed in its recent conferences and policy documents. In particular, at the top of its agenda, the Commission underlines the importance of reducing the "funding gap" in higher education and recommends that the EU should aim, within a decade, to "devote at least 2% of GDP (including both public and private funding) to a modernised higher education sector". Member States are also urged to ensure real autonomy and accountability for their universities, freeing them from "over-regulation and micromanagement". These are points emphasised by EUA President, Professor Georg Winckler, who was among the experts consulted by the Commission in the preparation of this document.

EUA will analyse the Communication in more depth in the weeks to come, concentrating specifically on the action points addressed to the universities that include recommendations to expand their funding base, enhance their areas of excellence and develop their competitive position.

EUA Position on Proposed FP7 Cost Model Supported at Prague Workshop

Hosted by the Czech Rectors' Conference and Charles University in Prague, EUA held a workshop on 5 May 2006 on the theme of "Universities' Participation in FP7: Towards Full Cost Support". As an initiative of the EUA Working Group on the Simplification of FP7 Funding Mechanisms, the workshop aimed at raising awareness within the EUA membership - with thirty university participants from the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Poland, Estonia and Austria - to discuss the proposed new "Rules of Participation" and the major changes they imply, particularly with respect to the re-imbursement of research costs and how they will affect the university sector in relation to the future sustainability of externally funded research projects. A particular aim of the workshop was to assess and debate the prospects (and barriers) for universities to operate effectively on the eligible research costs model proposed in FP7. The workshop demonstrated that most universities in the region have used the Additional Costs (AC) model. Re-tr aining for the new rules on eligible research costs would need considerable time and resources, particularly in adapting accounting systems.

The workshop focussed debate on the "EUA Statement on the Rules of Participation Proposals for Support Rates and Cost Models" which had been endorsed by the EUA Council meeting in Hamburg on 30th March 2006. The EUA Statement took the position that in the FP7 Cooperation Programmes the flat rate payment for the re-imbursement of indirect research costs should be fixed at 60% of total direct costs (on FP7 research and development activities for participating public bodies and higher education institutions) to ensure that the level of re-imbursement of research project costs to universities remains on a par in the move from FP6 AC model to the proposed FP7 eligible research costs model. The EUA viewpoint found strong support amongst university participants at the workshop. Without such

a measure applying as a transition phase to enable universities in the region to prepare fully for eligible research cost accounting, there was felt to be a serious risk of a fall in participation levels of New Member State uni versities in FP7.

DG Research Study on the European Scientific Publication System

Led by the Université Libre de Bruxelles and the Université des Sciences Sociales, Toulouse, the European Commission's Directorate General for Research published on 31 March 2006 a study on the European scientific publication system entitled "Study on the economic and technical evolution of the scientific publication markets in Europe".

As a contribution to the debate of the access to and dissemination of scientific publications in Europe, the study confirmed the essential role of scientific journals for research and the importance of making these publications ass accessible as possible. The study provides a number of recommendations for improving access to be further discussed at a conference devoted to the subject to be held in autumn 2006.

The European Commission would also like to hear the views of interested parties, and is therefore calling for reactions and contributions on the study and other issues linked to scientific publications.
